## **OUR LOCAL AIRCRAFT NAVIGATION HISTORY**

From the early 1960's there had been an aircraft navigational aid near Oakdale. Pictured below and located about two kilometers generally south of Tumbledown Trig which is about two and a half kilometers southwest of Oakdale township. Its access along Tumbledown Ridge was one of the first of what would be a designated Water Board fire road in the area, W9.

It had a power line that ran from Burragorang Road near Leo Rideout's orchard (Portion 159). It was located on Crown Lands managed by the Water Board and was a Permissive Occupancy for the Department of Civil Aviation (DCA).

However, it seems that the DCA were looking for a more suitable site and by 1964 were starting to build and upgrade sections of a road that had been put through the area first

by Clearys of Camden to get to the Red Cedar in the area, initially only going to about Mt Shivering from Twin Peaks. Later Gardner Brothers and Neville Lang formalized access to their properties from the west basically along the old Colong Travelling Stock Route (TSR) that was gazetted in the late 1800's. They had obtained compensation for 'loss of access' from the Water Board on the completion of Warragamba Dam and the inundation of Burragorang, thereby cutting off the access from the east.

In a press release statement (in part) from the Hon. R. W. Swartz, MBE, ED, Minister for Civil Aviation, Canberra 27 April 1966...."The Department of Civil Aviation will install a major mountain-top radio navigation aid at Bindook, in the Blue Mountains, 55 miles west of Sydney."

The new aid - a very high frequency Visual Omni Range (V.O.R.) would provide track guidance and act as a marshalling point for all aircraft operating on the western and southern air routes into Sydney.

This area needed the highest quality navigation aid available to help pilots and air traffic controllers maintain safe, regular airline schedules.

Air navigation aids provided pilots not only with essential track guidance, but with positive "fixes" in flight and with invaluable help when landing through low cloud.

A V.O.R. radiated signals in such a manner the 360 courses were available.

Omni ranges were located at major en-route stations and at major terminal airports.

Mr. Swartz said "the first stage of the more than \$60,000 Bindook Project — an access road to the mountain-top site was almost complete and work would soon begin on a building to house the equipment."

Up until the early 1960's

the road did not go through the Langs Bindook property but rather went north towards Grimshaw Hill and followed Bindook Creek to its junction with Back Swamps Creek (Batch Camp) and to the east of Morai Tops and Noorat Mountain and the Travelling Stock Route (TSR). It then generally followed the TSR to the Mount Werong end.

The new section of road went on a far better ridge top route over the Bindook Range from Back Swamps Creek and to the west of Mount Morai into and through Bindook then rejoining the TRS thus bypassing several creek crossings and wet areas

According to local lore it was most likely a route that Neville Lang had proposed as it was he who knew this area very well and would benefit him as it went through his property. Later this section of road would be re-routed and rebuilt to the north of the Bindook property which then formed part of the public road that now connects Yerranderie and the surrounding private lands to the west. Both my parents moved to Wollondilly when they were young Midwifery training at Liverpool Hospital. I worked at Queen children and attended school locally, my father at Oakdale and Victoria Memorial home, Camden, Campbelltown and later my mother at Mowbray Park.

I was born in Sydney and came home to my grandparents' house which was along Oakdale Road (Barkers Lodge Road). My Grandparents had an orchard, 'Waratah Orchard' where they grew apples, peaches, plums and later grew gladioli for the Sydney markets.

We moved into our house when I was about 3 months old just after my father and grandfather

finished building it. Our house was just up the road and was originally part of my grandparents' property. We also had a small orchard as well as apples we also grew potatoes, swedes, pumpkins, peas and beans for the markets. My parents, Jean and Stan Thompson lived in that house for the remainder of their lives.

My father had many jobs, he worked on the orchard, carted produce to the markets in Sydney then to Flemington. He cut wood and delivered it to some of the stores in Sydney for their furnaces, and he also cut mine props. He drove trucks and helped move buildings out of Burragorang valley before it was flooded. He drove coal trucks for Clintons, he was also an owner driver, and later drove my brother's truck. He was also a miner in the Valley Coal mines.

My mother worked outside all her life, mainly on my grandparents' orchard, but also other orchards at Lakesland. When my grandparents' property was sold, she also worked in a commercial flower garden, picking and packing flowers for the markets.

Growing up I spent a lot of time with my grandparents waiting for mum to finish for the day and also helping out. I attended school at Picton before completing General nursing and

Bowral hospitals.

The first few years after I was married we moved around a lot before building and settling in Belimbla Park where we raised our 3 children. I still live in the same house.

Both my parents were involved in Volunteering. Both were involved in Lakesland bush fire brigade, my father being Deputy Captain and my mother received a lifetime award for her

of Oakdale Girl Guides. Hence my volunteer involvement over the years in Brownies, Boys Brigade, Cub Scouts, Little Athletics, NSW SES and also the Heritage Centre. My Involvement in the Heritage centre came about after I was talking to Phil and Laurette Hughes after church one day and they mentioned they were volunteers. I knew about the Wollondilly Heritage Centre & Museum but never visited. In the Annual Report by the Minister for Civil Aviation for the financial years 1967-1968 it stated "The V.O.R. previously installed at Burragorang (Oakdale), was replaced by a V.O.R. at Bindook about 20 miles from Burragorang to obtain improved performance".

So, it seems the Bindook V.O.R. was completed and in operation at least by 1968.

The new and upgraded road was suitable first to get materials into the Nyanga Mountain area then after construction of the site to transport the diesel for the generators that powered the equipment, regularly trucked in, even during inclement weather. Unlike the site at Tumbledown/ Oakdale, where a power line was able to be

were not for the DCA to choose a location on Nyanga Mountain for a V.O.R. and upgrade the road that they had put in, what state would it be in now. The TSR was revoked and is now incorporated within Blue Mountains National Park. The Colong Stock Route road, however, remains a public road and is the legal access to Yerranderie and private lands within the

erected along the route, the Bindook site was quite a lot more isolated with no town power supply and located within the Warragamba Catchment Area, was monitored for any possible water quality issues by the Water Board. Later as transfer of land management occurred, it became located within the Blue Mountains National Park.

For many years this section of road was well maintained and those who drove it, especially during the winter snow periods, appreciated the orange guide posts that identified where the road was and this was also handy in rain and fog.

Like its counterpart at Oakdale, the Bindook Aircraft Navigation Aid was to be replaced but this time with very modern technology which made this site completely redundant. Around 2018 the site had all materials removed, rehabilitated and returned to nature. The DCA site at Tumbledown was utilized and repurposed but the current state is unknown.

This very important piece of safety infrastructure within Wollondilly Shire served the aviation industry for over 50 years and yet probably not many knew of it.

Although the Bindook Aircraft Navigation Aid at Nyanga Mountain in the Bindook Highlands has gone, what does remain is an important road with its own history. We should recognize and thank those who put so much into its construction and maintenance that we still benefit either to and from the private lands in the area, to and from the township of Yerranderie for recreation and tourism and for use by emergency services as required.

Prior to the TSR in the late 1800's, miners and stockmen found their way along this route by foot and horseback to access the area and later timbermen would also exploit its many riches, some would settle the area and others moved on and a couple of local families put in a good effort and made a road to the west after their access from the east cut off, one wonders if it

# A £1000 PROMISE

Following on from the December 2023 Newsletter 'A Plague of Ants' the Minister for Public Instruction, John Perry, had been true to his word. He had thought the case put to him for a new public school at The Oaks had ticked all the boxes.

A year later on Friday, September 19, 1902, he paid his first visit to the growing settlement to open the splendid new school building with space for 76 children. Built on concrete foundations, the walls were brick with dressings of a darker tone. With much concern about the health of the pupils, the exterior walls featured a two-and-a-half inch cavity to prevent damp while ventilation was provided by inlet and exhaust tubes. The teacher's residence boasted five rooms, a washhouse, pantry and bathroom. The work had been completed on the two-acre site on the corner of John and Burragorang Streets in an impressive six months by local builder, Jimmy Taylor, for the sum of £1,028 16s 6d including the fencing.

The Oaks turned out in force to welcome the Ministerial party who arrived as the clock struck 1pm with 250 people gathering at the school grounds. Accompanying Mr Perry were John Kidd, Minister for Mines and Agriculture and Member

for Camden, William Daley, a solicitor and Member for Sydney (Gipps Division), Mr Wigram, the chief architect and Mr

Wells, the clerk of works. The first stop was the new premises where a large number of children had gathered under the eagle eye of Patrick Kenniff, the teacher, and Miss Kenniff, the needlework instructor. After inspecting the building, Mr Perry was presented with an illuminated address by Jessie Moore on

school verandah; the Minister urged parents to use their home influence in the education of their children.

A sumptuous banquet had been laid on by Michael and Margaret Hennessy of the Sanatorium Hotel at a marquee erected in the school grounds. It was a good effort with the 20-something landlord only recently recovering from a bout of ill -health. Responding to the Royal toast, Mr Perry said he would pay high compliments to the district. Education should not be neglected; the Government must spend money in that direction. He would rather see £20,000 spent on schools than £1,000 on jails. At the conclusion of the proceedings, ornamental trees were planted in the school grounds before the official party departed for Sydney.

Public education had a lengthy record at The Oaks with a denominational school opening at the Roman Catholic Church

> hall in 1864. The Public Instruction Act of 1880 transformed it into a public school, still operating in the hall which was leased by the Department of Public Instruction. **Enrolments** had steadily climbed from 36 in the first year to 62 in the last quarter. The campaign for a new school building was launched by The

Oaks Progress Association in 1898 culminating in the successful delegation to Mr Perry in 1901 ■
